Kings Hill – Milton Lane, Hazen Road, Queen Street, Regent Way, Pearl Way, Fortune Way	Υ	The Parish Council believes that further restrictions, including the introduction of double yellow lines in these areas, are necessary to improve safety, access, and traffic flow. The primary concerns relate to obstructive parking near junctions, on bends, and in areas where visibility and access for emergency vehicles are compromised.	Double yellow lines	 04/07/25 DR - The Parish Council does not feel that the recent parking review conducted by TMBC sufficiently addressed the ongoing parking concerns in Kings Hill. The review primarily focused on adopted distributor roads and junctions, omitting several key areas where persistent parking issues remain. The following roads were not included in the final implementation or had restrictions withdrawn or deferred: Milton Lane – proposals withdrawn due to potential one-way traffic scheme considerations. Hazen Road – similarly affected by the one-way traffic scheme review. Queen Street – largely unadopted and therefore excluded from the formal review. Regent Way – restrictions omitted following consultation feedback. Pearl Way – omitted from the final proposals. Fortune Way – elements withdrawn due to potential one-way traffic impacts.

The committee supports the investigation and potential implementation of a 20mph speed limit on Queen Street , Milton Lane , and Fortune Way , due to ongoing safety concerns, including frequent speeding and near-misses involving pedestrians and cyclists.

The one-way scheme would include Fortune Way, after the entrance/ exit to Waitrose (Tower View end) to its junction with Milton Lane, and the full length of Milton Lane from Fortune Way and Alexander Grove. The preference would also be to include parts of Queen Street to create a loop however this is partly managed by Kings Hill Residential Management who are currently unwilling to engage in the proposed one-way scheme. There is a concern re. Milton Lane becoming one-way causing further issues with congestion should cars get caught up behind a refuse lorry	23.06.23 - A design has previously been drawn up by KCC which shows how a one-way scheme (not including Queen Street) could work. No direction for the flow of traffic had previously been determined so the first step would be to carry out some ATCs in order to review traffic flow and the direction that is most likely to be complied with. KCC will also need to review bin lorry movements to confirm whether or not this is in line with the proposed flow of traffic. Parish Council to discuss in more detail at their next meeting early July and will confirm whether or not they wish to pursue this scheme as per the previous design, at which point ET will arrange the necessary surveys (11.07.23 - Parish Council confirmed that this decision has been deferred until September 2023). 08.09.23 - Sarah Hudson confirmed that the Parish Council wish to proceed with a one-way scheme to include Fortune Way, after the entrance/ exit to Waitrose (Tower View end) to its junction with Milton Lane, and the full length of Milton Lane, from Fortune Way to Alexander Grove. ET has requested three ATCs for both Fortune Way (before and after Queen Street) and Milton Lane in order to

				prioritised. One of the factors we use is the recent
				personal injury collision data. There have been no
				recorded incidents here within the last three years
				(up to 30.09.2019). Formal crossings must also be
				justified in terms of the potential conflict between
				pedestrians wanting to cross the road and vehicles
				travelling past. Again, our observations on site
				suggest that the degree of conflict is not high
				enough to justify further investigation by KCC at

	markings at these locations which I would be happy
	to pay for or upgrade the warning signs to include flashing amber lights (which I can quote you for).

	02.06.23 – The Parish Council confirmed that they still wish to pursue the possibility of installing a
	zebra crossing at Discovery School due to the way
	in which parents park and drive along Discovery Drive at school times.

	HADMS data shows that there have been no
	damage only or personal injury collisions on this section of Discovery Drive in the past three years
	and average speeds are below 20mph. However, it
	does not look like a traffic survey was carried out, as suggested previously, so this is something that
	ET can arrange as a first step to investigating the
	suitability of this road for a zebra crossing, as there must be an existing 20/30mph speed limit in place
	with a measured 85%ile speed (the speed at, or
	below 85% of traffic travels) below 35mph.

	consider the following:
	The outcome of a pedestrian survey
	(which ET can arrange in conjunction with
	the speed survey). This is needed to calculate the PV2 value which will
	determine if a zebra crossing is appropriate



	for this location. Whether or not street lighting is in place to illuminate the crossing at night. If there are footways on both sides of the road, at least 1.8m wide. Is there a nearby power supply for the belisha beacons? Will there be good visibility for drivers and pedestrians (i.e. not on or near a bend, on a hill or obscured by trees or parked vehicles etc). The minimum distances for visibility of pedestrian crossings for approaching traffic are based on the 85th percentile speed. For example, the recommended stopping sight distance for a road in which 85% of drivers travel at 30mph is 40m. Would the crossing be away from junctions (absolute minimum 5m from side roads and well away from signal junctions) and clear of private driveways?
	The Parish Council should bear in mind that, even if all the criteria above is met, they will need to give consideration to the need for a zebra crossing given the existing facilities, as outlined in comments from 2020, as the cost for a basic zebra crossing can be prohibitive.
	The design fee for a scheme such as this would be £1980, at which point, KCC would be able to provide a quote for the delivery of the works. However, zebra crossings typically start from about £21,000, but this can increase significantly if any additional costs are incurred, such as road closures, resurfacing of the carriageway, relocation of utilities, additional electrical supply etc.



		We would also advise the Parish Council to carry out an informal consultation to gauge community support due to the loss of parking and especially if the zebra crossing is to be installed outside residential properties. Update 23.06.23 - Following the site visit it was agreed to pend this request for the time being as the main priority is the one-way system. It was also decided that the Primary School could do some engagement with parents in the first instance. ET confirmed that the school does not have a School Travel Plan and the Parish Council will encourage the school to contact KCC to put a plan together in the first instance. ET has sent details to the Parish Council regarding this (11.07.23 - Parish Council confirmed that this has been passed onto the school).
